CROSSING GUARD TRAINING PROGRAM BACKGROUND

Trainings

2013 (pilot)

- Essex, Middlesex, and Burlington
- 75 officers

2014

- Mercer, Monmouth, Bergen, Atlantic, and Union
- 179 participants from 130 municipalities

2015

- Ocean, Camden, Essex/Hudson, Morris, and Passaic
- 146 participants from 110 municipalities



CROSSING GUARD TRAINING PROGRAM SUMMARY FOURTH PROGRAM YEAR

2016

- 114 crossing guard supervisors/trainers trained from 83 communities
 - Gloucester County Police Academy
 - Bergen County Law and Public Safety Institute

Over four years, supervisors from 263 municipalities have been trained. The training has reached approximately 67% of the municipalities that have crossing guards.

Over the years, municipalities have sent multiple officers to the training, as well as new supervisors as they take on the supervisory role.



CROSSING GUARD TRAINING PROGRAM LESSONS LEARNED


Attendance at trainings

- Crossing Guard Placement
 - Guards are crossing children on 2-3 legs of an intersection
- Children/Teens/Parents do not listen to Crossing Guards
- Training is an opportunity for Crossing Guards to talk about their work



CROSSING GUARD TRAINING PROGRAM LESSONS LEARNED – URBAN

- Crossing Guards using pedestrian walk signals
- Crossing Guards leaving post in emergency
- Attendance and incentives
- Uniform augmented by bicycle flashers
- Trucks and buses take longer to stop
- Public education for motorists –
 What is a crosswalk? What is Stop and Stay Stopped law?



CROSSING GUARD TRAINING PROGRAM REQUESTS

Traffic safety officers requested:

- assistance with evaluation of crossing guard posts to determine optimum placement
- assistance with conducting crossing guard training directly
- model crossing guard job description
- information on STOP paddle size, sources for equipment




TRAFFIC SAFETY OFFICER SURVEY PEDESTRIAN SAFETY AT SCHOOL CROSSINGS




Survey Results


- Challenging School Crossings
- Survey of NJ Police Officers via Crossing Guard Supervisor training program and Police Traffic Officers Association.
- 176 valid responses
- 30% No problem reported
- 186 intersections identified (up to 3 intersections per municipality)



Key Findings



Key Findings



Key Findings

- Predictable is preventable
- Leverage expert local knowledge
 - Surveys, interviews with police departments & crossing guards
- How to track near-miss incidents/ Limits of crash data
- Crossing Guard safety is often overlooked
- Roadway engineering vs. safer driving

CROSSING GUARD TRAINING PROGRAM TRAFFIC OFFICER FOCUS GROUP - URBAN

Issues Raised

- Design issues in the school zone affecting drop off and pick up procedures
 - gridlock, double parking, school and transit buses, and blocked crosswalks
- Educational outreach needed to address school zone motorist and pedestrian behavior
 - distracted driving and walking
 - school policies

Possible Next Steps

- Literature Review
- Film arrival and dismissal
- Interview experts in effective school zone design
- Explore programmatic options
 - Community traffic committee

CROSSING GUARD TRAINING PROGRAM NEXT STEPS

- New Jersey has over 6,800 crossing guards.
- The training program has reached 67% of municipalities with guards.
- Spring 2017 trainings
 - Essex/Hudson
 - Hunterdon/Warren/Morris (39/115/307)
 - Atlantic/Burlington/Gloucester (167/287/255)



CROSSING GUARD TRAINING PROGRAM NEXT STEPS

- Training resources to instruct crossing guards and assist supervisors
 - Video on Challenging Crossings
- Crossing Guard appreciation events/awards
- Reach communities with no local police department – collaborate with State Police
- Collaborate with others working on pedestrian safety
